

□ Activity 2: Wounded Knee

As you saw in the film that you viewed yesterday, the massacre at Wounded Knee resulted in a devastating loss of life for native people.

Imagine that the site of the Massacre at Wounded Knee needs a new sign that explains to visitors what happened there. Your task is to design the sign on a blank piece of paper. Your design must include both words and images (for example, photographs, symbols, a timeline, a map), and the information you provide must be accurate and engaging.

Consider these questions as you create the design for the sign:

- What is important to know about Wounded Knee?
- What happened there and why did it happen?
- Who was involved?
- How should the information about Wounded Knee be organized on the sign?
